#### **CLINICAL SERVICES**

#### ANTICOAGULATION

The pharmacist monitors and adjusts warfarin and/or other anticoagulant based therapy, utilizing labs and patient evaluation. The Direct Oral Anticoagulants (DOAC) Regional Safety Net program will address medication adherence and renal dose adjustment, as well as peri-operative management.

#### COMPLETE CARE MANAGEMENT (CCM)

The pharmacist works with patients requiring complex medication-related interventions secondary to CVD (Diabetes, Hypertension, Cholesterol). The pharmacist performs a complete medication assessment and provides patient education to members.

# MEDICATION THERAPY MANAGEMENT (MTM)

The MTM program's goal is to optimize drug therapy outcomes through improved medication use by targeted members. The MTM pharmacist performs a comprehensive medication review.

#### **OUTPATIENT INFUSION SERVICES**

Outpatient Infusion is an integrated service incorporating three services: Oncology, Home Infusion and Ambulatory Infusion. Under protocol, the pharmacist manages various chemotherapy complications, performs medication reviews, and optimizes antibiotic therapy.

#### RENAL

The renal pharmacist assists primary care physicians and nephrologists in managing chronic kidney disease (CKD) patients at risk for progression by managing their chronic diseases. The pharmacist also rounds in the Peritoneal Dialysis clinic.
